# **Pre Operation Info - Bitch Spay**

When a female dog gets spayed, the veterinary surgeon removes the ovaries and womb (Ovariohysterectomy)

## What are the benefits of spaying a female dog?

- Prevents seasons
- Prevents unwanted pregnancies
- Prevents infections in the womb (Pyometra)
- Prevents false pregnancies (Phantom pregnancy)
- Reduces the chance of mammary, ovarian and uterine cancer

#### When is it safe to spay a female dog?

It is safe to spay a female dog before it's first season, however we recommend that you wait three months following the end of their season as it helps reduce the risk of hormonal problems.

### What you need to do before your dogs operation

- No food 6-8 hours before the procedure
- Lift their water bowl first thing in the morning
- If there are any signs that your dog is unwell leading up to the operation, please contact the practice
- Ensure you dog has been treated for fleas and worms recently
- Try to make sure that your dog is clean on the day of their surgery
- Please also make sure your dog has emptied their bowel and bladder before they are admitted
- Ensure your dog is up to date with their parasite treatment

# On the day

- The operating vet will examine your dog to make sure they are healthy and in the best condition for the operation
- The nursing team will closely monitor your dog before, during and after their spay
- Your dog will have shaved areas on one or both legs and a large shaved area where the procedure has taken place (mid abdomen)
- Your dog will be discharged the same day, the time may vary depending on each operating day and its schedule
