Pre Operation Info - Dog Castrate

When a male dog gets castrated, the veterinary surgeon removes both testes (Gonadectomy)

What are the benefits of castrating a male dog?

- Prevents unwanted pregnancies
- Reduces the risk to seek a female dog to mate with
- Can help eliminate certain behaviours (humping)
- Reduces the chance of testicular cancer and prostate problems

When is it safe to castrate a male dog?

We recommend that small/medium breed dogs are castrated from 9 months of age and large/giant breed dogs are castrated from a minimum of 1 year old dependant on growth.

What you need to do before your dogs operation

- No food 6-8 hours before the procedure
- Lift their water bowl first thing in the morning
- If there are any signs that your dog is unwell leading up to the operation, please contact the practice
- Ensure you dog has been treated for fleas and worms recently
- Try to make sure that your dog is clean on the day of their surgery
- Please also make sure your dog has emptied their bowel and bladder before they are admitted
- Ensure your dog is up to date with their parasite treatment

On the day

- The operating vet will examine your dog to make sure they are healthy and in the best condition for the operation
- The nursing team will closely monitor your dog before, during and after their castration
- Your dog will have shaved areas on one or both legs and a large shaved area where the procedure has taken place (above the testicles)
- Your dog will be discharged the same day, the time may vary depending on each operating day and its schedule
- Your pet will be discharged by one of the nurses, where they will go over all of the post op information
